Report from Uganda by Hilda Kugonza, MCMC administrator

Greetings from Uganda. Mothers and Children's Medical Clinic is located at Bulamu village, Gayaza. Our main goal is to improve the health of the communities through preventive and curative care. We offer basic affordable health care to residents with a focus on prevention and treatment of malaria in mothers and children. Currently we are 8 staff members on contract: 2 medical officers, 2 nurses, 1 laboratory assistant, 2 in administration and 1 security guard. We have a doctor on call any time.

HEALTH CAMPS. We have carried out monthly community outreach health camps, but due to the Covid 19 pandemic, we no long do so. However, we are hopeful that with improved vaccination rates in the country, we shall be able to resume. These attracted over 100 people per camp, offering free malaria testing and treatment for a small fee, free mosquito nets to pregnant mothers and children under 5 years of age, and free deworming. This could only happen due to the generosity of your support towards us. (continued on page 2)

Brittany Farro talks about Epilepsy Program

Approaching epilepsy has been a vision of MCMC given the significant disability it creates in our community. The epilepsy support group has been meeting for over one year, signifying the first leg of MCMC's Epilepsy Program.

Social and spiritual stigma surrounding seizures and epilepsy have led to significant misunderstandings about the disease, and the support group has been established to help break down these barriers in order to create trust for establishing a therapeutic relationship for comprehensive treatment going forward. We provide some basic needs including a backpack to hold materials for support group, some basic staples for food, and a notebook and pen to record medical history and lessons learned while in support group. The fellowship provided by several families meeting and sharing their stories has felt groundbreaking and unifying. As one of the myths of epilepsy is that someone who suffers seizures is unable to work or sustain a trade, we provide lessons to learn a craft. We provide the initial materials for them to begin, and then help them sell their goods. So far we have covered basket weaving. Being able to create and sell something has been therapeutic and provided hope for their future.


Additionally, we have recently advanced services to provide each patient with psychological support from a clinical psychologist who has experience working with epilepsy patients. She provides another layer of stability and trust with psychological evaluation and therapy, and important focus on medication compliance and lifestyle factors.

Irene Nakalanzi, mother of two, is one of the MCMC epilepsy project participants who had this to share;

"I have no regrets joining the Epileptic fellowship program at MCMC. Before, I used to get my treatment from Kasangati Health Center. Sometimes I could miss seeing the doctor, getting drugs, and used to get very little time for counseling or none. This was very disappointing. But now, I get enough time with the Doctor, interact freely with her because she listens to me as I express my complaints, I always get good time sharing with my fellow participants and get my drugs on time. I no longer feel alone or so stigmatized and I look forward to attending every fellowship. I used to worry so much about getting some money but at least now thought this fellowship, I have learnt a new skill of weaving baskets and the expectation of earning money from it eases my financial struggles. Thank you MCMC for your generosity. There is hope after all!"

MATERNITY SERVICES. The regulatory paper work for the maternity services is complete, and we have the practicing license approved, ready to serve our community with antenatal, postnatal and child immunization.

REPRODUCTIVE SERVICES. We work together with Reproduction Health Uganda through their outreaches to offer free family planning and screening of sexually transmitted infections, cervical cancer, and breast cancer. This happens every three months, but due to Covid 19 we have had to put them on hold until the situation normalizes.

AMBULANCE. With the generous offer of an ambulance made, we shall be able to assist the vulnerable mothers, children and all those that need urgent evacuation to a health facility that is above our grade and run by the government of Uganda.
